# PRACTICAL HORTICULTURE COURSE

HOW TO SOW, PLANT AND GROW VEGETABLES, FRUIT AND HERBS

This 8 week course will be delivered in two modules. Each module lasting four weeks.

Module 1 will start on Saturday, 4<sup>th</sup> June. Module 2 will start on Saturday, 2<sup>nd</sup> July.

This full course will cover the following topics:

- Growing a range of vegetables, fruit, herbs and edible flowers
- Soil suitability for growing vegetables, fruit and herbs
- Preparing ground for vegetables, fruit and herbs
- Compost, manure and fertilisers
- Common pests and diseases
- Weed identification and control
- How to maintain vegetables, fruit and herbs
- Pest protection and weather protection
- Watering and feeding of seedlings, plants and in polytunnels
- How and when to harvest and how to store vegetables, fruit and herbs
- Seed saving and its importance
- Safety, tools and garden hygiene
- Garden structures and supports for vegetables and fruit
- How to make a compost heap what to put in them and how they should be used.

The course will be delivered by the staff of **the North Mayo Heritage Centre every Saturday morning from 10 am until 2 pm**and funded through the Community Education Programme of the MSLETB

All equipment and seeds and plants will be provided and you take home what you grow at the end of the course. Numbers are limited and you must be over 18 years old.

s part of this year's Cultural Programme the play 'Six Days' will come to the Conference Centre at Enniscoe on Friday 20th May 2022.

This play is part of a 13 date Nationwide tour which will finish in the town hall Westport. The play is written, directed and performed by Frank Shouldice and tells the story of his grandfather during the 1916 Easter Rising

'We are simply overwhelmed with the audience response to 'Six Days'. After selling out our Dublin run we wondered how it would be received around the country. I'm happy to say the tour has lived up to -- even surpassed -- any hopes we had. Although my grandfather was far too modest a man to even imagine himself centrepiece of a powerful stage drama he is very much the main character behind this true and evocative story' Frank according to Shouldice.

'The Easter Rising was a pivotal event in emergence of an independent Irish state but history often overlooks the ordinary men and women who made it happen. My grandfather was one of those ordinary people who did extraordinary things when called upon. He was also a very proud Mayoman and, for me, taking 'Six Days' to Enniscoe House and Westport feels like we are bringing his legacy home.'

Brigade's Dublin 1st Battalion at the Four Courts was the last Volunteer garrison to lay down its arms in the Easter Rising. Having faced incredible odds all week the battle for North King Street did not end when Padraig Pearse issued an order to surrender. It was, for those who lived through it, an experience they would never forget.

Using spoken word and original music Chambermade Productions presents SIX DAYS, a highly evocative reimagining of those incredible events. Based largely on the personal accounts of those who took part SIX DAYS is performed by writer/director Frank Shouldice, whose grandfather was a sniper at the Jameson Malthouse Smithfield.

Frank will be accompanied by cellist Frieda Freytag whose signature pieces are composed especially for this performance. Soundscape design by Sean Higgins.






### A brief history of the townland **GLANDAWOO**

Glendaduff, Gleann Dá Dubh, (the glen of the two Blacks i.e. black-visaged people).

Located in the east of the parish of Attymass. It contains 747 acres, 1 rood, 32 perches\*, including 18 acres, 1 rood, 26 perches\* of water. The property of Col. Browne, of Browne Hall, and Mr. Curtis, of Dublin. Agent, Mr. Howley, Broadlands, near Killala. It is let to Mr. Franklin, Revenue Officer, who sublets it to 9 occupying tenants, at will in divisions, at from £5 to £10 per division. Co. Cess\*\* 3 shillings 0½d per acre. Tithe by Composition, £8 6 shillings 3d., but is withheld by tenantry. Soil, light clay, moory and rocky (a mountain), producing oats, flax and potatoes. Bog

Prevailing Names - Gallagher and Cawley. Loughdoo is on the boundary between this townland and Kilasser parish. Glendaduff Lakes (2) are in this townland; and between this townland and Kilmactigue parish in Co. Sligo (in the southeast) flows the Bealboy River. There are trout and eel in the lakes, and salmon in the river. Killeen Fort, a burial ground for still-born and unbaptised children, is in this townland. There is a standing flag-stone in this graveyard with a cross cut on it, and there is, also, another flagstone covering a small grave, with a cross cut on it.

- \* There are 40 perches in a rood, and 4 roods in an acre.
- \*\* The County Cess was a form of local taxation. It is derived from the word 'assessment'.

### **Brief history of the surname FERGUSON**

This Scottish surname, among the forty commonest in Scotland, was brought to Ulster by settlers, most of whom came with the plantation schemes in the first quarter of the 17th century.1

A Scottish name (Mac Feargusa) numerous in Ulster. It is also used as a synonym of Fergus in Co. Leitrim.<sup>2</sup>

Ferguson, Fergus, Vargus, Farguson, M'Faryse, M'Fargus, Mac Fearghusa, 'son of Fearghur' (super-choice); the name of a Scottish family, some of whom settled in the north of Ireland in the early part of the 17<sup>th</sup> century.<sup>3</sup>

Ō Fearghuis, Ō Fearghusa, O Farguise, O Farris, O Ferris, O Farrissa, Fergus, Ferris, Farris, Farrissy; 'descendant of Fearghus' (super-choice); the name (1) of a medical family in West Connacht who were hereditary physicians to the O'Malleys; and (2) of an ecclesiastical family in Co. Leitrim who were coarbs of St Mogue, or erenaghs of Rossinver. At the end of the 16<sup>th</sup> century, the name was very scattered.<sup>4</sup>

Of the 133 Ferguson births in Ireland in 1890 – including variants – 11 occurred in Leinster, 1 occurred in Munster, 107 occurred in Ulster, and 14 occurred in Connacht. The surname was principally found in counties Antrim, Down and Derry.
